\$10,000 for Victims of Typhoon Haiyan

MOM donated \$10,000 for relief and rehabilitation of disadvantaged people of the Phillipines affected by the devastation of Typhoon Haiyan that struck in November 2013.

This was one of the strongest typhoons ever recorded with winds exceeding 200mph, approximately 4.1 million people displaced from their homes and and over 4.5 thousand lives lost.









Funding for the Children - Vietnam Supported by Grovedale, Torquay & Anglesea Parishes

In the small community of Kontum the opportunity to board at school is a great privilege when it is common for students to travel for two hours or longer to get

to the local school each day. There are now fourty-seven girls boarding and able to attend school through the increase in size of boarding facilities, which are run by a group of Vietnamese nuns of the Divine Providence Order. It is hoped that this will assist and encourage the girls to continue in mainstream education in order to enhance their future employment prospects and life opportunities. The girls were chosen from big families who were found to have a profound love of learning. Below is an image showing the type of home that the girls typically come from.

Each girl receives support for accommodation, tutoring and food. Access is also provided to books, arts and craft materials and computers.





New additions to their library, shown above, help the girls learn English, using miniature toys and a variety of art supplies to create their own English stories. Below are photos of the library before and after the purchase of equipment.







Infant mortality and malnutrition are prevalent in Kontum. In order to combat this, three hundred children at the local Government school are provided with breakfast and lunch. This

encourages them to attend school and also improves their ability to learn. An extra responsibility of the boarding girls is to help with the daily food preparation. Judging by these faces, the boarders make promising chefs!

Any Excuse for Health, Education & Fun Gulf Province, PNG Teachers from Papua New Guinea's highlands gathered from

Teachers from Papua New Guinea's highlands gathered from 18 different regional villages on 6th of June 2013 for a service to welcome newly qualified teachers funded by MOM. They were joined by Mrs Aku, Mary Anne Moses (the new elementary school teacher), Sr Anastasie and Sr Pia. They get together at least three times a year, updating themselves, sharing their knowledge with the younger generations and preparing them to be the future leaders of their communities.

The students from throughout the highlands also came together for the Children's Camp in 2013. This time in September at **Kanabea Station**. These camps are arranged to coincide with visits from doctors and nurses from Austalia. The Children's camp is the only means to bring the younger generations together - otherwise they have no chance to visit Kanabea and the medical centre. They take this opportunity to give the childeren a medical check up and allow them to enjoy the other activities including sports and drawing competitions.

> All these little ones walked 6 to 9 hours, and some of them over night, from their villages to reach the station. Locals at Kanabea appreciate them and enjoy their presence during their stay in the station.

Because of the geographical distances between their homes and the accomodation children gather for camp at different times.

All of the children actively participate in the activities and are happy to receive prizes after the sports.



Pictured above are students at the **Kaminakawa Literacy School**. where there are 54 students. The teacher, Francis, is shown teaching them how to write. The children attend their school from 8am to 12 noon. To return to their Literacy School and go home it takes 15 hours from Kanabea Station.

All Around Education, West Africa

Education in West Africa is vitally important, not just for the children, but also for ensuring the skills of those who are teaching the next generations. Funds from MOM support a variety of projects allowing all education levels to benefit.

Projects we have been involved with in 2013 include the restoration of walls surrounding St Joseph's Primary school, Sierra Leone (pictured). In recent years the walls have been in such poor condition that they could collapse at

any time without warning. Sewage seeps through the wall into the school playground because of blocked and broken drainage. This poses a serious health risk to the children, especially in an area where typhoid is widespread and cholera outbreaks are already an issue. The poor condition of the wall also means that windows are often broken in attempted break-ins, which is costly. Currently, the only subsidy given to government assisted schools is less than \$1.80 AUD per child.

To aid the school in its educational progress, plans are underway to build a new wall using funds

from Melbourne Overseas

Missions and money raised in the local community.

Below left, you can see a close up of wall blocks showing the extent of mortar disintegration, as well as a view of the wall, shelter and building behind the school compound.

As the expatriate sisters in Gambia, Sierra Leone and Ghana head towards retirement, the responsibilities are handed on to locals. For instance, local midwife Sister Josephine (pictured in white on front cover) has

now been employed as a health program supervisor in the development office. Sister Josephine is completing a research paper on teenage pregnancy, which has been a huge problem in the area. This is endeavouring to combat the young girls at school who become pregnant by helping them return to education.

Another local, secondary school teacher Sister Anne (pictured below right) is enrolled to study management. Upon the completion of her course Sister Anne will be fully trained in accounting procedures, human resource management, information technology and project management.

Country or Regional Focus of Program Activities: Papua New Guinea and Pacific Islands, Peru, Africa, India, Philippines, East Timor and Pakistan. **Educational & Resources:** Information on MOM history, objectives and activities is available from the secretary. Pamphlets and general information is promulgated through parish priests to parishioners throughout the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

Linkages & Affiliations: Partnership is developed with local indigenous people.

SCOPE

We have audited the summarised financial report of Melbourne Overseas Missions Fund for the year ended 30th November 2013 in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards.

The Note 2(a): (a) During the financial year, the St. Paul's Overseas Aid Fund (OAF) Committee packed and forwarded to Mission Stations a total of 400 boxes (2012: 368 boxes) each weighing an average of 16kgs and valued as \$445,000 (2012 \$389,500). The boxes contained various items of medical supplies such as wound dressings and bandages, soap, sheets, blankets and clothing. Apart from the above, Melbourne Overseas Missions (MOM) sent 15 boxes of donated goods including IT equipment video machines and books to Papua New Guinea to the value of \$4,000.

Purpose: To encourage self-help and self reliance through education programmes of literacy, gender equality, human rights, health, hygiene, agriculture, cottage industry and small business cooperatives.

No single appeal, grant or other form of fund raising for a designated purpose generated more than 10% of total income for the financial year ended 30 November 2013.
